2. Background on the organization and the project

Right to Play is a global organization committed to improving the lives of children and youth affected by conflict, disease and poverty. Established in 2000, Right to Play has pioneered unique play-based approach to learning and development which focuses on quality education, life skills, health, gender equality, child protection and building peaceful communities.

Due to socio-cultural differences in humanitarian and refugee settings in Sub-Saharan Africa and the Middle East, one country from each of these regions has been chosen to carry out research, and to pilot new innovative tools. By including both regions in this study, RTP can better understand the strengths and challenges of addressing GBV and gender equality (GE) in different contexts, and there can also be cross-regional learning and sharing of results.

3. Research Objectives

The proposed research aims to improve the ability of Right to Play International (RTP), and other humanitarian organizations, to measure and gauge the impact of the gender-responsive play-based programming in bringing about a change in addressing harmful gender norms that lead to gender-based violence amongst adolescents in refugee and host populations in Lebanon and Uganda. It also aims to develop tools and approaches that RTP staff can use, across regions, and together with adolescents, to measure the impacts of their programming on the socio-cultural norms and attitudes that can lead to GBV; as well as to provide adolescents in humanitarian settings a means to have greater voice and agency, through their engagement with play-based tools.

4. Methodology and scope

A workshop was held in Lebanon in 3 areas to take stock of existing approaches, tools, and capacities to measure and monitor changes in socio-cultural norms in relation to gender-based violence (GBV) and gender equality (GE) amongst adolescent girls and boys. Focus group discussions were conducted with different stakeholders in Palestinian refugee camps; youth, parents, school principals, and GBV specialists.

Based on the information from the workshop, specific research questions, methodology and workplan for phase 2 can be finalized.

To address gaps, weaknesses, and opportunities revealed in the country workshops, a play-based tool will be developed in phase 1 to collect evidence on GBV and social norms in refugee settings. This will be piloted and tested in phase 2. A plan will be developed to pilot the play based GBV monitoring tool and finalize it based on the findings. Furthermore, a clear plan will also be put in place for building capacity of RTP staff, coaches, and volunteers, in using the tool and improving integration of GBV lens across all programs (including programs that are not focused centrally on GBV).

Anticipated number of working days for the consultancy is **4-5 days**.
